
## 2009 marks the 300th anniversary of the first large-scale German migration to British North America.

Frustrated with an oppressive social system, driven by chronic poverty and the recent devastation caused by the War of Spanish Succession, about 13,000 people left the Palatinate in 1709. Up until the turn of the century they were followed by roughly another 100,000, the vast majority of whom headed for the mid-Atlantic colonies and southern backcountry

The goal of the interdisciplinary conference is to investigate new facets in the socio-political, religious, cultural, and literary history of this very heterogeneous group of immigrants between the late seventeenth and the late eighteenth century.


